Red Altar Cloth for Holy Week

[altar: noun. 2.contemporary Christian - 'a table or flat space set aside for the actions and artefacts (objects) symbolising prayer, sacrifice and commitment to following the Trinitarian God. Origin. Old Testament worship of God.'

altar cloth: *noun.* 'cloth or paper cover placed on altar, or to designate a "set aside" area. Artefacts (objects) may be placed on this.' [MFP Dictionary of Contemporary Ecclesiology]

Readings for Holy Week.

Palm Sunday: Luke 19 (Entering Jerusalem) Place a piece of your Palm branch, or another tree, on your altar i.e. this paper.

Monday in Holy Week: Mark 11 verse 12, to end of chapter. (Anger in the temple)

Tuesday in Holy Week: Mark 14 verse 1, to verse 31. (Expensive perfume; The last supper) Dab some perfume, vanilla essence, after-shave, or anything nicely scented, on your altar cloth.

Wednesday in Holy Week: John 13 (Washing dirty feet; Judas makes his move) Place a facecloth or soap on your altar.

Maundy Thursday: Mark 14 verse 32, to end of chapter. (In the garden; In court) Place some soil or grass on your altar.

Good Friday: Mark 15 (or John 18 & 19 for John's fuller version.) (Trial and death)

Place your hand-made cross from today's service, or another you make from found-objects, on your altar.

Easter Saturday: "The women who had been companions of Jesus from Galilee...saw the tomb where Jesus' body was placed. Then they went to prepare burial spices and perfumes. They rested quietly on the Sabbath (Saturday), as commanded." Luke 23: 55, 56. Place a stone on your altar.

Easter Sunday: Luke 24. (Jesus has come back to life.) Remove all the objects on your red paper and change your red paper for a white piece of paper or fabric. Let your Easter egg rest here as long as you can. As you eat it, be reminded of the new start in life that God offers you through what Jesus has done. Leave the wrapping on your white altar for a few days.

Take this home. Place it on your table or desk - somewhere it will remind you of what this week is about. Use the readings each day.

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RHYTHMS OF GRACE 2020

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The Story

Sit in your seat and read through the story. Underline anything that stands out to you.

If you want to, go to the "Expectations" station and take a barbed wire cross; and to the "Heading To Jerusalem" station and pick up a red paper and a palm branch to take home with you. Use these to reflect on the story during the week.

The Stones Will Praise...

What are you grateful for?

Write that on a stone and add it to the cairn.

[*cairn*: a mound of rough stones built as a memorial or landmark.]

Crying for the City (v41)

O God of the marginalised, teach me how to understand others. Let me share in the hurt and hunger of the street, the alleyway, the corner, the neighbour.

Help me to turn my apathy and distractedness into creative justice.

Renew me with the experience of your grace and the reality of your love and mercy. Through Jesus Christ, who is my Lord as well as my save-r, Amen.

Dip your finger in the salty water and press those "tears" onto the map near where you live, as a symbol of your prayer for yourself and your city.

PALM SUNDAY

Jesus: The Expected One, But Not the One They Expected. (God's April Fool's Day joke?)

Luke 19/28-48 (The Message)

28-31After saying these things, Jesus headed straight up to Jerusalem. When he got near Bethphage and Bethany at the mountain called Olives, he sent off two of the disciples with instructions: "Go to the village across from you. As soon as you enter, you'll find a colt tethered, one that has never been ridden. Untie it and bring it. If anyone says anything, asks, 'What are you doing?' say, 'His Master needs him.'"

32-33The two left and found it just as he said. As they were untying the colt, its owners said, "What are you doing untying the colt?"
34They said, "His Master needs him."
35-36They brought the colt to Jesus. Then, throwing their coats on its back, they helped Jesus get on. As he rode, the people gave him a grand welcome, throwing their coats on the street.
37-38Right at the crest, where Mount Olives begins its descent, the whole crowd of disciples burst into enthusiastic praise over all the mighty works they had witnessed: Blessed is he who comes, the king in God's name! All's well in heaven! Glory in the high places!

39Some Pharisees from the crowd told him,"Teacher, get your disciples under control!"**40**But he said, "If they kept quiet, the stones would do it for them, shouting praise."

41-44When the city came into view, he wept over it. "If you had only recognized this day, and everything that was good for you! But now it's too late. In the days ahead your enemies are going to bring up their heavy artillery and surround you, pressing in from every side. ... Not one stone will be left intact. All this because you didn't recognize and welcome God's personal visit."

45-46Going into the Temple he began to throw out everyone who had set up shop, selling everything and anything. He said, "It's written in Scripture, My house is a house of prayer; You have turned it into a religious bazaar."

RESPONSE STATIONS:

Invitations: Have a quick read through the possibilities below. Find something that catches your attention. They are in no particular order.

You may choose to use one, several, all, or none of them to guide your reflections. Move around the space when you are ready. Include any children with you by explaining what the station is about.

Heading To Jerusalem (v28) Pick a Palm branch.

Sit with Jesus for a while as he gets ready to head to Jerusalem.

Reflect on what is ahead for you in the next week, month, year....

Where are you heading? What change of direction is needed?

What do you need from Jesus today? Clarity? Understanding? Courage? Insight? Wisdom? Forgiveness? Strength? Presence?

Write your prayer on the table cloth.

As you share the meal in community with your fellow followers of Jesus, encounter the risen Christ and receive from him what you need to move forward.

Take your Palm branch and a *Red Altar Cloth* with you to guide your reflections through this week.

What Jesus did during Holy Week (maybe!)]

Monday: Clears the Temple **Tuesday:** Mount of Olives; Judas does a deal. Wednesday: Takes a break Friday: Trial; crucifixion; death; burial Saturday: Nicodemus; tomb; Hades

Palm Sunday: Heads for Jerusalem; sends 2 disciples to find transport; enters to adulation.

- Thursday: Passover; upper room; kiss; denial; arrest; trial

Tennebrae/Service of Shadows

Seven sayings •Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do Today you will be with me in paradise •Woman, behold, your son! Behold, your mother! • My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? • thirst •It is finished •Father, into your hands I commend my spirit



Tonight we are remembering the death of Jesus. This service is loosely based on the "Tenebrae" services that date back to early church history. There are six "shadows" that represent six stages of the Good Friday events. At each stage there will be an episode from the gospel narrative that describes one of the Good Friday events. a time of silent prayer, a symbolic action, and then a reading of an Old Testament scripture that sheds some light on this, At each stage, a candle will be extinguished, until all the light is gone. This will be followed by the strepitus, the slamming closed of the Bible, symbolic of the earthquake that shook the land when Jesus died. We will then spend some time waiting with Jesus in the dark of the grave.

This is a sombre service, with time for reflection on the sufferings of Christ.
